

TRUMP'S TRANSPARENCY PUSH

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➔ **Noncitizens on State Voter Rolls:** In 2026, Homeland Security found that states which implemented the SAVE system to protect election integrity were able to weed out hundreds of thousands of deceased and noncitizen voters: "In the short time that the enhanced SAVE system has been available to states, 10 have states [sic] processed their full voter lists."

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➔ **Ukraine Corruption:** Around December 2019, the FBI Foreign Influence Task Force – Russia (FITF-R) began gathering previously reported intelligence unfavorable to Biden with the aim of showing that it was "Russian disinformation."



China's Acquisition and Exploitation of American Voter Data

Heavily redacted documents reveal that China obtained voter registration records, which included sensitive personal identifiable information (PII), from 18 states during the 2020 election.

Executive Summary

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Maricopa County Voter Database Search

- In [September 2020](#), an employee in technical sales and website support discovered a vulnerability in the Maricopa County Recorder's Office website when he noticed that his voter ID appeared in the URL.
- He then wrote a script "which accessed and extracted the voter registration data" from the website. In October, he [extracted](#) "[b]etween 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 voter registration records" and stored them on personal hard drives until the website's firewall was fixed.
- He [testified](#) that he soon felt remorse for his actions, and deleted the information from his computer.
- Between [October 21, 2020, and November 2, 2020](#), nearly 633,000 voter records were accessed. 930 of these records contained "sensitive information," such as "domestic violence victims, Judges, and law enforcement officers." The information included "full name, voter ID, party affiliation" but not social security numbers.

"Round River"

- Around December 2019, the FBI Foreign Influence Task Force – Russia (FITF-R) began [gathering](#) previously reported intelligence unfavorable to Biden with the aim of showing that it was "Russian disinformation."
- The intelligence came from confidential human sources and [concerned](#) the Biden family's ties to Ukrainian dark money, or what FITF-R called the "Ukrainian narrative."
- The task force produced a [spreadsheet](#) labeling Republicans such as Bill Barr, Mike Pompeo, Lindsay Graham, Chuck Grassley and others as Russian "conduit[s]." George Soros, John Kerry, Barack Obama, Hillary Clinton and other high-profile Democrats and leftists were labeled "target[s]."
- One example of the corruption was Joe and Hunter Biden's involvement in Burisma Holdings, owned by a Ukrainian energy executive named Mykola Zlochevsky. One memo [reads](#): "Burisma Holdings owns thirteen companies, which are used to pay

dividends on investments through fake consulting contracts. The contracts are paid to US investors and funneled through Latvia and the energy sector of Ukraine. Joe Biden and his son, Hunter Biden, have money invested into Burisma. Their investment was passed through a shell company in Latvia.”

- Kash Patel, director of the FBI, [wrote](#) that the agency is “committed to ensuring that future counterintelligence operations remain focused exclusively on legitimate foreign threats and are never used to advance political narratives.”

“March Toll”

- On May 10, 2017, the FBI [opened](#) an investigation into Attorney General Jeff Sessions for potentially lying to Congress about his Russian contacts.
- Two Democratic Senators, Patrick Leahy and Al Franken, [wrote](#) to James Comey about Jeff Sessions’ Congressional testimony denying Russian collusion: “Given his own admissions regarding contacts with the Russian ambassador, including at the Republican National Convention, and particularly in light of his description of his lack of recollection of what was said during the conversation, Attorney General Sessions’ written testimony to Senator Leahy appears to be discernably false. His testimony to Senator Franken also appears to be unequivocally false.”
- Sessions [responded](#) to the Senators’ letter by defending the truthfulness of his Congressional statements, and saying that he did not mention his contact with the Russian ambassador over the years because “the question did not ask about them.” He reiterated that, to his recollection, his discussion with the Russian ambassador had nothing to do with the political campaign.
- The FBI also cited a Huffington Post article from March 2017 [speculating](#) that Sessions and Russian ambassador Sergey Kislyak likely interacted at a conference hosted by the Center for National Interest which they both attended.
 - “Though the event was small, it is unclear if Sessions and Kislyak spoke directly...”

“Oxford Comma”

- On May 16, 2017, the FBI [opened](#) an investigation based on “an articulable factual basis that reasonably indicated” that Trump “may be or had been, wittingly or unwittingly, involved in activities for or on behalf of the Government of the Russian Federation which may have constituted violations of federal criminal law or threats to the national security of the United States.” It pursued the following lines of evidence:

- A Trump campaign team member indicated that Russians offered to assist the campaign with an information leak that would damage the Clinton campaign.
- U.S. intelligence knew that Russian intelligence had access to DNC networks and the emails of senior Democrats.
- “Open source reports” indicated that the Trump campaign intervened to soften language on Ukraine after Russia’s annexation of Crimea.
- Trump had “long-standing business and real estate ties” in Russia.
- The investigation also [inquired](#) whether Trump “obstructed and/or conspired to obstruct” an investigation into Russian interference in the 2016 election.

Noncitizens on State Voter Rolls

- In 2026, Homeland Security [found](#) that states which implemented the SAVE system to protect election integrity were able to weed out hundreds of thousands of deceased and non-citizen voters: “In the short time that the enhanced SAVE system has been available to states, 10 have states [sic] processed their full voter lists. As of June 22, 2026, a total of 25 different states processed more than 68 million registration records through the SAVE system. DHS has enabled those states to identify over 400,000 deceased registrants and over 28,000 non-citizens who illegally registered to vote.”

- By contrast, states that did not utilize the SAVE system revealed that: “OVER 250,000 NON-CITIZENS ARE ILLEGALLY REGISTERED TO VOTE IN JUST THE FOUR STATES FOR WHICH PUBLIC DATA FILES HAVE BEEN REVIEWED.”
- A report by Homeland Security and the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency [collected](#) evidence that foreign adversaries were exploiting vulnerabilities in

U.S. election systems. “Unclassified reports from the last decade reveal that Statewide Voter Registration Databases (VRDB) are attractive targets for foreign adversaries. Hackers have attempted to breach voter registration systems in all 50 states, with confirmed successes in at least 20 states. However, experts have routinely minimized the significance of successful voter registration breaches and the exposure of sensitive personal data used for voter verification.”

- Unclassified examples [include](#):
 - In August 2021, “Chinese state-sponsored cyber actors aggressively targeted U.S. critical infrastructure to steal sensitive data and personally identifiable information (PII).”
 - In September 2020, “CISA and the FBI reported that members of the Iranian Republic Guard Corp attempted to exploit websites to obtain voter registration data.”
 - In July 2016, “Russian actors hacked the website of a state board of elections and stole information related to approximately 500,000 voters, including names, addresses, partial social security numbers, dates of birth, and driver’s license numbers.”
 - In June 2016, “Russian government cyber actors attempted to identify and exploit SQL database vulnerabilities in web servers and databases.”

Michigan Voter Registration Probe

- On March 11, 2021, the DOJ [opened](#) an investigation in Michigan over allegations of “potential payments for registrations for the 2020 national election.” The investigation was dropped.

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Vulnerabilities in Electronic Voting and Ballot-Counting Systems

- From 2004 to 2020, U.S. intelligence services [monitored](#) Venezuelan elections and found Venezuelan interference in electronic voting systems, including Smartmatic technology.

- This intelligence [exposed](#) vulnerabilities in electronic voting systems “that could theoretically be exploited by sophisticated actors with insider access.” This led the U.S. to force Smartmatic to divest from U.S. systems.
- The report [adds](#) a caveat: “However, while the intelligence validated significant concerns about foreign-linked voting technology vendors, it did not definitively confirm that large-scale electronic fraud was successfully executed in specific Venezuelan elections, with CIA’s baseline assessments maintaining that other factors better explained electoral outcomes. The reporting on advanced techniques like [redacted] provided concerning insight into alleged Venezuelan government capabilities and intent, but came from limited sourcing.”
